
COMMUNITY CONSERVATION CLASSES

Measure of how quickly water is applied to soil, measured in inches per hour.

Ability of a soil to hold water, measured in inches of water per foot of soil.




forums, or workshops that provide opportunities for farmers to talk, teach, and work together with urban landowners and users.

EAST CASSIA HOSTS DIVISION IV FALL MEETING



Lt. Governor Scott Bedke addresses Supervisors from the Division IV area of Southern Idaho.

East Cassia Soil & Water Conservation District hosted the Fall Division IV meeting on October 30, 2024 at Wick's Steakhouse in Declo, Idaho. East Cassia Chairman Rob Cottle opened the meeting and introduced Lt. Governor Scott Bedke as the keynote speaker discussing water issues in Southern Idaho.

Eleven Soil Districts make up Division IV including East Cassia, Balanced Rock, Blaine, Camas, Gooding, Minidoka, North Side, Snake River, Twin Falls, West Cassia, and Wood River. District Supervisors attend Division IV meetings twice each year.

Chairman Cottle turned the remainder of the Division Meeting over to Division IV Director Richard Kunau to address Division Business. Elections were held and Richard Kuanu from West Cassia SWCD was unanimously voted to retain his seat as Division Director. Nicolas Purdy from Blaine SCD was elected as Alternate Director, and Luke Stevenson from Minidoka SWCD was elected as the Division IV Secretary/Treasurer.

Each District gave a report on projects and programs they are currently implementing within their own areas. Reports were also given by the following cooperating agencies: IASCD (Idaho Association of Conservation Districts), ISWCC (Idaho Soil & Water Conservation Commission), NRCS (Natural Resource Conservation Service), and IDEA (Idaho District Employee Association). After dinner, Speech & Poster Contests were held with the theme: "May the Forest Be With You Always". Poster Winners included 2 5th grade students from Declo Elementary School and 1 from Dietrich Elementary School. The Speech Contest for High School students was held and winners were from Wood River, West Cassia, and Minidoka Districts.

Plan your windbreak now. Order your seedling trees early. (see order form in this newsletter)




REBATES for MINIDOKA COVER-CROP PLANTINGS

Minidoka Soil & Water Conservation District is offering a rebate to farmers who are planting cover crops. Some of the requirements include:

- * Must be in Minidoka County,
- * Planting cover crops or planting ground cover,
- * Using best practices in the fall or early spring to assist in mitigating wind and water erosion on highly erodible fields,
- * Up to 120 acres can qualify at a possible rebate of \$6 per acre.
- * Seed mixes must be in accordance with Idaho Seed law



2025 SEEDLING TREE SALE

LOMBARDY POPLAR (Populus nigra 'Thevestina') 40 to 50', Zone 2. A perfect choice for a fast-growing privacy screen or wind break. Wonderful columnar habit with grayish-green foliage that provides a gorgeous backdrop for smaller trees and shrubs. Branches start close to the ground and grow upward, parallel to the trunk. Plant in rows about 6-8 ft. apart for screening. Hardy to -40°F.

NORWAY POPLAR (Cottonwood Siouxland) (Populus deltoides) **40** to 60′, Zone 3-9. This hybrid poplar is a fast-growing tree used for windbreaks and riparian plantings. Can be used down a property line or roadway. (Up to 6 feet per year with regular irrigation and protection from wildlife and animals.) Requires moist soil but can tolerate dry soil. 20-35′ spread. Plant seedlings 8-12 feet apart for single row, 10-12 feet apart for multiple row windbreak.

RED MAPLE (Acer Rubrum) 50-60', to Zone 9. Noted for its lovely fall color, the Red Maple is a relatively fast-growing deciduous tree of pyramidal habit when young, becoming rounded to oval at maturity. The leaves emerge red, changing to dark green with whitish undersides and often develop dazzling yellows and red in the fall. Full sun or part shade. Grows in moist to wet, but well-drained soils. Native to North America. Excellent planting for lawns and streets.

AMERICAN ARBORVITAE (Thuja Occidentalis) 20'to 40' Zones 3-8. American arborvitae is a low-maintenance plant that tolerates clay soil, wet sites, and air pollution. It grows best in moist, neutral to alkaline, well-drained loam. It does not tolerate dry or exposed, windy sites. It grows well in full sun or partial shade. It is globular, pyramidal, or columnar to conical in growth form. Its density crown provides nesting sites for songbirds. A distinctive feature of this tree is its dominant trunk. The bark is grayish-brown to reddish-brown with shallow furrows. Small oblong cones appear in the spring, mature to a brown color in the summer, and may persist. Planted in groups or rows, it performs well as a hedge, privacy screen, or windbreak.

BALSAM FIR (Abies Balsamea) 40' to 60' Zones 3-6. Plant in sun to light shade with moist, well-drained soils. Protect trees from drying winds. Balsam fir is used primarily for Christmas trees and pulpwood. Balsam fir is native to the far northern parts of the United States and into Canada. Needles are 3/4 to 1 inch long, flat, and often strongly curved. It is generally found in areas with a cold moist climate and with 30 inches or more of annual precipitation. This evergreen tree has flat, dark green needles with a strong balsam scent. Balsam fir makes a striking figure in the landscape with its narrowly-pyramidal shape, but it does best in cooler northern climates.

COLORADO SPRUCE (Picea Pungens) 30 to 50', Zones 3-8. Gorgeous, brilliant, stately. The Colorado Blue Spruce is a slow growing pyramidal shaped evergreen with steel blue foliage. It prefers heavier soils, full sun, and clean cultivation. Will reach a height of six feet in eight years on a good site. Probably the most drought tolerant of all spruce. It is widely used in windbreaks or as an ornamental yard tree or Christmas Tree.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN JUNIPER (Juniperus scopulorum) 30 to 40′, Zones 3-8. Rugged, pyramidal tree with silvery-blue green foliage. It is slow growing with foliage is dense and pleasantly aromatic. The fruits are fleshy berrylike spherical cones – they are bright blue with a whitish bloom and sweet tasting, with thin skins (good source of food for wildlife). Survives well in hot dry summers of western U.S.

CARAGANA - (Siberian Pea Shrub) 12—14 feet tall, Zones 2-8. A very hardy, medium to tall, upright shrub native to Siberia. Caragana has a moderate growth rate. It can withstand extreme cold and dryness. Adaptive to wide range of soils types and high pH. Yellow flowers bloom in May or June followed by seed bearing pods that ripen in July. Excellent for windbreaks and wildlife habitat.

GOLDEN CURRANT – 6 to 8', Zone 4. Thorn-less, loosely-branched, irregularly-shaped, deciduous shrub which grows to 6-8" tall and spreads suckers. Round, medium, bluish-green leaves that turn dull yellow in fall. Golden yellow flowers appear in the spring and emit a strong, clove-like fragrance. Fruit is edible - black berry which can be used in jellies, preserves and pies.

HANSEN HEDGE ROSE – Height: 3'-5', All Zones. A living fence selection. Single pink to white fragrant blossoms appear in June and bloom all summer. The rose grows at a rate of up to two feet per year and will grow up to 6 feet tall. Disease resistant and winter hardy. Suitable for most any well drained soil. Space plants 24 inches apart in the row to create a fast-growing hedge.

COMMON PURPLE LILAC (Syringa Vulgaris) Height 12-15', Zones 2-8. Lovely clusters of lavender flowers grow from the branch tips in mid-spring. They make a wonderful contrast to the dark green leaves. Abundant clusters of sweetly fragrant, purple flowers in mid-spring on a vigorous, upright, multi-stemmed shrub with heart-shaped, green foliage. Ideal as a flowering hedge or screen. Plant near a window or pathway where the fragrant blooms can be enjoyed. Deciduous.

LILAC, WHITE (Syringa Vulgaris) Height: 8′-15′ Zones 3-7. The very hardy Syringa Vulgaris, more commonly known as the common lilac, is a beloved deciduous shrub celebrated for its showy and sweetly fragrant spring flowers. Its pristine white flowers bloom on long, showy upright panicles in the mid-spring bloom time. The dark blue-green, heart-shaped leaves provide an elegant complement to the clustered blossoms. Lilacs grow best in full sun and well-drained soil. It can handle dry to moist soils. Lilacs grown in partial sun or shade will not flower well. The shrubs may take three to four years to establish themselves in a new site, but once established they can live for centuries. The bright white flower clusters are ideal for cuttings. Lilacs can be planted in a row as a hedge or single planting.
